Community Dialogue: Can a Font Be Racist?

Wednesday, September 20 5pm IME Suite

Can a font be racist? Join us on Wednesday September 20th in the IME suite at 5pm to learn about the history of ethnic typefaces, specifically the "chop suey" font (used in the late 19th c.). We will learn about how the font is used to perpetuate Asian stereotypes and otherness and open up the space for discussion. Food will be provided and no prior knowledge is needed to attend!

Come hear about the role family played in the informal 19th-century network that developed into a system of people who assisted freedom seekers headed to new lives away from their enslavement. Valerie will explore the importance of what have come to be known as the Underground Railroad stations, the locations--often private homes--in which self-liberated people were sheltered on their journeys. She'll include attention to her ancestors to reflect on how they were involved in supporting her great great grandfather's role helping folks get from one place to another in Pennsylvania, Massachusetts, New York, and Delaware.
