- Germany: Memories of a Nation (available for free to download from the BBC, Apple Podcasts, Spotify, and a few other places). We are only listening to about half of the episodes, which I have tried to group thematically as assignments for three of our meetings. However, the entire series is excellent, so if you enjoy the assigned podcasts feel free to go ahead and listen to the other ones as well. And if you would rather read something than listen to it, there is a book version of the podcast.

Apps:

If you have an iPhone, you may find the following apps useful for getting around/navigating in Berlin. Equivalent apps can be found for Android phones.

- BVG Fahrinfo (Free): The BVG is the organization that operates public transport in Berlin. This free app lets you plan trips, check departure times, and even purchase tickets for immediate travel.
- VBB Bus & Bahn (Free): VBB is the umbrella organization that coordinates public transport for Berlin and the surrounding state of Brandenburg. This free app lets you plan trips, check departure times, and purchase tickets for immediate travel.
- Pocket Earth (Free to try, in-app purchase to download maps): A highly useful map application that allows you to save map data from OpenStreetMap (along with Wikipedia entries) to your phone. Very useful not only for finding your way around but also for finding information about local monuments, all without needing mobile internet access.
