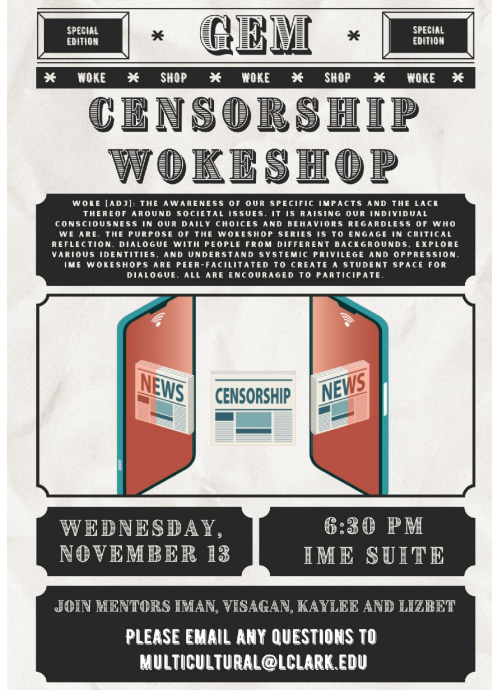
Censorship Wokeshop

Dr. Jordan AG Douglas-Tavani recently finished his Ph.D in Linguistics at the University of California, Santa Barbara. Jordan is an enrolled member of the Central Council of Tlingit & Haida Indians of Alaska. His work is centered on indigenous language description and revitalization. For the last 5 years, Jordan has worked with the Confederated Tribes of Coos, Lower Umpqua, and Siuslaw Indians on revitalizing one of their tribal languages: miluk t̓iis. He is interested in complex morphosyntax and linguistic typology and language contact within the Pacific Northwest.

SHPEP is a free 6-week summer enrichment program focused on improving access to information and resources for college students interested in the health professions. SHPEP's goal is to strengthen the academic proficiency and career development of students underrepresented in the health professions and prepare them for a successful application and matriculation to health professions schools. The UW program is 6-weeks in residence program.

SHPEP Highlights at the University of Washington:

- Travel costs, room and board and a \$1000 stipend are provided for all UW SHPEP participants + \$100 extra weekly food allowance (UW program).

- Pathway sessions directed towards exploration of the admissions process, and the development of an individualized education plan
- A 'Learn to Learn' curriculum designed to teach scholars how to approach STEM courses using best practices in learning through academic courses in biology, chemistry and population health
- Case-based learning from development of a proposal to poster presentations
- Shadowing experiences with healthcare providers and public health researchers
- Clinical simulation experiences including Stop the Bleed Certification; Nursing and Dental simulations
- Lectures from health care leaders on SDOH, Racism in Health, etc
