Our innovative First-Year Seminar consists of two courses: **Words** and **Numbers**. These courses are taught by professors from all disciplines around the institution, and each Words and Numbers course is unique, based on the individual professor's areas of interest. Courses range from This American Language to The Promise and Peril of Cryptocurrency. All students will take one of these courses in each semester of their first year.
